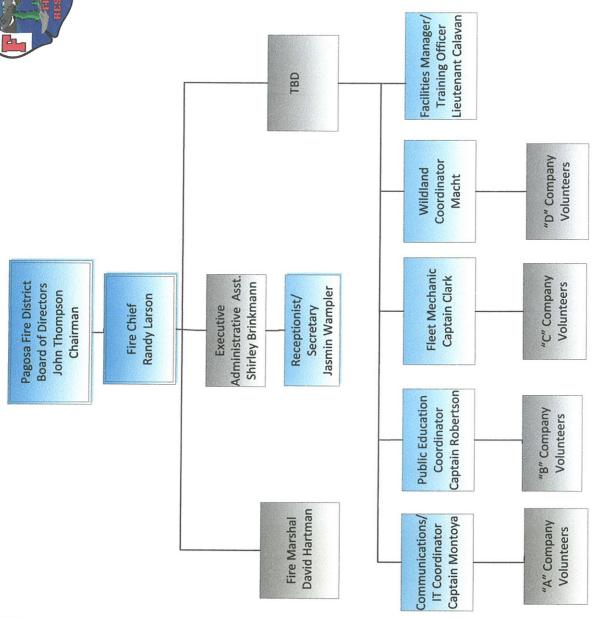

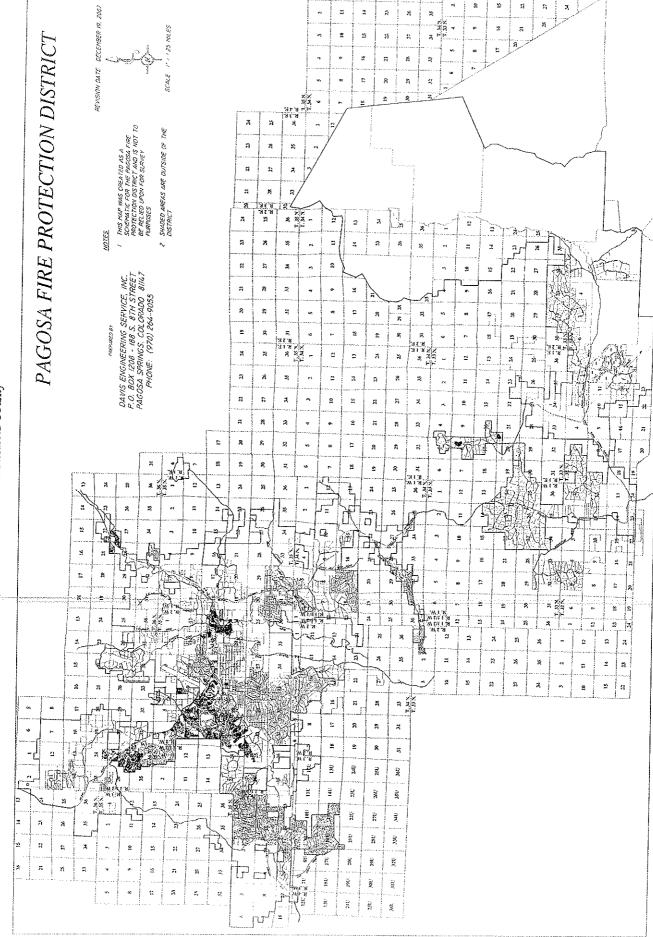

Pagosa Fire Protection District 2017 Budget Message

The Pagosa Fire Protection District (PFPD) went through an administration change when Chief Diane Bower retired after an accomplished career. Assistant Chief Randy Larson was promoted to Fire Chief in August of 2016. In the time since the department has undergone a change in policy for the upcoming 2017 budget year.

For the 2017 budget cycle the Fire District will work toward a balanced budget by using the procurement of taxes levied at a rate of 4.067 mill (0.5 mill is directed by statute for volunteer firefighter pension.). Therefore, the District sees spendable tax revenue of 3.567. Estimate tax revenue for 2017 is \$1,008,784. The District will also see some additional revenue in grant funds, reimbursements, and fees. These items are not included in whole in the revenue portion of the budget since they are arbitrary and change from year to year.

In 2016 PFPD procured a loan for the purchase of new Self-contained Breathing Apparatus' (SCBA) in the amount of \$245,095.65. PFPD used \$104,447.61 of the Impact Fee account as a down payment. The term of the loan is for 7 years with an annual payment of \$38,887.88 with no penalty for early payoff. The SCBA purchase was necessary for safety issues. The SCBAs being used currently are on the verge of being out of compliance with the National Fire Protection Association guidelines. PFPD will seek grant money to assist in the payoff of this loan. An SCBA line item will be added to the budget for the annual payment amount.

The budgetary goal for 2017 is to have a balanced budget with expenditures not exceeding expected tax revenues and using any overage from the additional revenues discussed above to begin building our Contingency Reserves back to an acceptable level. To accomplish this, the District will continue to cut arbitrary expenses without cutting services and seek out alternative funding sources for capital expenditures and unforeseen emergency situations.

The PFPD relies heavily on a dedicated volunteer commitment and works with a minimal staffing of 2 Chief Officers, 4 full time Fire Officers, 1 Wildland Fire Coordinator and 1 Fire Marshall that work an 8-5 Monday – Friday schedule and 2 administrative personnel. Those Fire Officers perform the functions of Fleet Maintenance, Information Technologies (IT), Building Maintenance, Public Education, Fire Prevention, Plan Reviews, and Business Inspections.



Pagosa Fire Protection District 2017 Budget Process

The annual budget process is designed to meet the requirements of the Pagosa Fire Protection District, the Citizens of the District and various Colorado State Statutes. The District fiscal year is the same as the calendar year and the annual budget developed per the timeline and established procedure is implemented January 1st of the following year.

JUNE

- The Fire Chief and Executive Administrative Assistant evaluate issues and problems associated with the last budget process and made modifications within the process, if necessary.
- The Fire Chief makes strategic issues and concerns to be addressed in the next year's operating budget.
- The Executive Administrative Assistant updates the Budget Calendar and detailed procedures, forms and specific guidelines.

JULY

- Distribution of all procedures, forms, guidelines, and updated calendar are issued to the Captains in charge of program budgets.
- The Fire Chief meets with Captains that maintain a program budget and issues them a year-to-date report.

AUGUST

- Departmental budget worksheets due August 15th.
- The Fire Chief reviews and evaluates each program budget.
- The Fire Chief meets with each Captain to review and discuss issues and make adjustments to their program budget.
- The Executive Administrative Assistant consolidates the departmental budgets.
- Assessor submits the preliminary assessed valuation figures for the upcoming budget year.

SEPTEMBER

- Revenue projects are updated.
- The Fire Chief reviews and evaluates the preliminary Proposed Budget.
- The preliminary Proposed Budget is consolidated, summarized.

OCTOBER

- The Fire Chief presents the preliminary Proposed Budget to the Board of Directors in a public meeting.
- A public notice informing the Citizens of the November Public Budget hearing is published in local newspapers.
 Changes are made to the Budget.

NOVEMBER

Public Hearing on the Budget.

Note: Citizens may inspect the Proposed Budget and make comments and or objections at any time after the Proposed Budget has been issued, up until the moment the Budget is adopted.

DECEMBER

- Final assessed valuation figures for the ensuing budget year are received from the Assessor, no later than December 10th.
- The Budget is presented to the Board of Directors and Citizens.
- The Board of Directors shall consider a Resolution to Adopt the Budget.
- The Board of Directors shall consider Certification of Tax Levies.
- Certification of the District's mill levy is submitted to the Board of County Commissioners.

JANUARY

- On January 1, the Budget approved and adopted in December becomes effective.
- A certified copy of the budget is submitted to the Division of Local Government by January 31st.

One of the main aspects of budget preparation is to set priorities, whether it be new programs, expansion of existing services, continuation of existing programs, or reduction of existing programs. The budget is basically a prediction of services to be provided by the District. It is based on measurable objectives and guidelines. The purpose of the budget is to outline the cost to achieve these objectives.

- Publish a notice informing the public of the November Public Budget Hearing.

NOVEMBER

Public Hearing on the Budget.

DECEMBER

- Assessor makes changes in assessed valuation, no later than December 10th.
- Adoption of Budget, Certification of Tax Levies.
- Certification of the District's mill levies submitted to the Board of County Commissioners no later than December 15th.

JANUARY

• A certified copy of the budget submitted to the Division of Local Government by January 31st.

The Colorado State Statutes require adoption of the budget as of December 15th. The budget calendar developed and presented above ensures compliance and legal requirements.

Communications

Department Overview

The Pagosa Fire Protection District utilizes several communication systems and equipment, including Very High Frequency (VHF) radios and 800MHZ radio system. The 800MHz radio system is a blend of traditional two-way radio technology and computer-controlled transmitters. These radios are used for Public Safety and Homeland Security. The VHF radio refers to the radio frequency range. The Active 911 digital messaging system delivers alarms, maps, and other critical information instantly to first responders. Concise and clear radio communication can help an emergency incident go smoother and contribute to a successful outcome. The communications department ensures adequate radio procedures are in place and monitors basic radio procedures and practices.

Key Facts - 2017

The Pagosa Fire Protection District is currently using two radio systems. VHF and the State Digital Trunked Radio (DTR) System (800MHz). The DTR system is maintained by the State of Colorado with no current cost to the department. The VHF repeaters are owned and maintained by the department. Pagosa Fire has been issuing mostly VHF equipment to volunteers.

- 67 800MHz portable radios
 - √ 45 are 2007 models (10 years old)
- 52 VHF portable radios
 - ✓ 21 have been taken out of service. These were broken and non repairable.
- 21 out of the remaining 31 radios are 2007 or older models. They are non repairable.

2016 Accomplishments

2017 Goals

Pagosa Fire has been struggling to maintain and interface two different communication systems. The time has come for us to decide on one system to be used as a priority system and the other to be used as a backup system Transitioning over to the State DTR system would be the most cost effect due to the maintenance would not be the responsibility of the department. Coverage of the State DTR system is equal or better than the VHF. The VHF radios are becoming obsolete and non repairable. The transition to the DTR system would begin by removing extra portables from the apparatus and placing them in the hands of the firefighters. Over a period of time purchasing the remainder portables.

Facilities/Maintenance

Description

The Facilities/Maintenance Department oversees the grounds and maintenance of 7 stations. It is the responsibility of the department to ensure that all district facilities are safe, clean and maintained. Oversees subcontractors needed to complete any work connected to the districts landscaping, snow removal, repairs and remodel projects.

Key Facts - 2017

Pagosa Fire Protection District (PFPD) is a **combination** department. PFPD consists of both career and volunteer firefighters: approximately 52 volunteers and 8 full time firefighters. The staff works from 8-5 Monday through Friday. Station 1 is the only "staffed" station at this time. After 5:00 p.m., including weekends, one staff person is in command.

Station 3 is a Training facility. It is equipped with a live fire training tower and has been used by the Colorado Firefighter's Academy to host training workshops.

- Station 2: 95 Falcon Place, Hatcher Lakes.
- Station 3 (Training Facility): 5508 US Highway 84, Loma Linda area.

- Station 5: 38 County Road 136, Aspen Springs.
- Station 6: County Rod 400, Hidden Valley Subdivision.
- Station 7: County Road 382, Chromo.

Fire Prevention

Department Overview

The statement "a fire that does not occur is the one that is most easily controlled", a fire that does not occur is the one that cannot take a life or damage property. This accurately describes the ultimate goal of any fire and life safety inspection and investigation program. The goal of this division is to identify hazards or potential hazards and take mitigating action to prevent the hazardous event from occurring. We are granted the authority to do this by Colorado State Statute CRS Title 32. We accomplish this by the administration of the International Fire Codes, Pre Incident Planning of commercial property, and Post Fire Investigation, that are performed following NFPA 921 Guide for Fire and Explosion Investigation.

Key Facts - 2017

This division's inspection responsibilities are:

- Routine Inspections
- Response to Complaints
- Eminent Hazards
- New Construction
- Change in Occupancy
- Pre Incident Planning of Commercial Property

These inspections are performed to identify potential hazards.

This division's plan review responsibilities are:

- Land use Permits (Plot plans)
- Commercial Remodel
- New Commercial Construction

These Plan Reviews are to insure that the buildings are planned and constructed within the standards outlined in the International Fire Code, so that they are not built or occupies with known hazards.

The Fire Prevention division performs Post Fire Investigations and safe and systematic analysis of fire and explosion incidents. Fire investigation or analysis and the accurate listing of causes are fundamental to the protection of lives and property from the threat of hostile fire or explosions. It is through an efficient and accurate determination of the cause and responsibility that future fire incident can be avoided.

This division has the responsibility of Pre-Incident Planning, a document developed by gathering general and detailed data that is used by responding personnel to effectively manage emergencies for the protection of occupants, responding personnel, property, and the environment.

At present this division only has one administrator assigned.

- 11 fire investigations

Fleet/Maintenance

Department Overview

Pagosa Fire Protection District (PFPD) is dedicated to providing quality, safe, and reliable apparatus to our District and our members. PFPD maintains its own Fleet, utilizing one fleet mechanic and a service truck. The fleet mechanic is responsible for the preventative maintenance, mechanical repair of specialized fire vehicles, heavy fire apparatus and related mechanical equipment. The fleet maintenance department maintains comprehensive maintenance records on all district vehicles. All NFPA testing and inspections are completed annually. The fleet department evaluates all vendors for cost, timeliness and effectiveness.

- Support school programs and provide fire engine escorts for sporting events

- Work with EMS in developing life and fire safety programs that will benefit our community

Training Division

Department Overview

The Training Division provides reliable and up-to-date educational and practical information for fire personnel. The Training Division is responsible for assigning and coordinating training for all members of the Pagosa Fire Protection District (PFPD). Training hours are tracked for certification renewals to maintain state certification requirements.

Key Facts - 2017

Due to the constantly changing world, training out of district is essential. This allows Pagosa Fire Protection District (PFPD) to keep up with construction, tools, techniques used for combating vehicle extrication, structural firefighting, hazardous materials, and wildland firefighting.

When new recruits sign up to be a volunteer firefighter they are put through a 6 week recruit academy. This academy teaches them the basics of our operations and what is expected to perform as a volunteer firefighter. Recruits are put through a rigorous physical ability assessment. They learn about the different types of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), how to operate on the fire ground using the Chain of Command and Incident Command System (ICS) and the tools and equipment they will be using. These are the building blocks for them to move on to a more advanced training and grow in a professional capacity.

PFPD does in-house training in addition to the out-of-district training. Trainings are held 3 times a month to help keep skills fresh and finely tuned. PFPD has state certified instructors that are capable of teasing Firefighter 1 and Hazmat Operations classes.

The Training Officer is part of the Four Corners Training Officers Association that includes officers from the four corners area. This Association offers training opportunities to PFPD geared towards training new officers.

2016 Accomplishments

- Six new recruits completed the Recruit Academy and obtained their Basic Wildland Firefighting certifications.
- Four officers obtained their EMT-B/IV certifications.
- Training Officer completed HAZMat Operations class.
- A training manual was developed, including a detailed instruction guide for skills performed.
- A Task Force, consisting of 5 volunteers, overseen by the training division, was formed to help write, coordinate, and implement new training ideas for the department.

2017 Goals

- Continue with the Training Task Force and mentor them into eventually taking the training duties of training with the supervision of the training division.
- Continue building and updating the Training Manual.
- Create a stable training schedule.
- Schedule Lieutenants for classes at NFA, or one of the local NFA weekend classes.
- EMR class offered together with EMS.

Wildland

Department Overview

The Wildland Fire Division is a key department that provides Training and Wildland responses in and out of the District. The Wildland Division provides training and reimbursement back to the District by sending requested equipment to out of District, State or Federal wildland assignments. The District benefits by these assignments, training our firefighters to be better prepared in the event the District has a large scale incident. The tasks of wildland firefighters are arduous, physically demanding, and require firefighters to be in top physical shape. Wildland firefighters carry packs and equipment weighing approximately 40 - 120 pounds. The wildland fire season days are long. Engine crews are designed for initial attack and extended attack of Wildland fires on local or "home" forest units. Wildland firefighters are trained to work with hand tools, hoses, portable pumps, radios and other specialized equipment. The crews of Wildland firefighters construct fire lines, create hoselays and conduct burnout and mop up operations.

Key Facts - 2017

In order to keep a good standing and maintain the good name PFPD has earned, we need to maintain and improve our equipment. Our current fleet of Brush Trucks has fiberglass tanks and pumps that are over 25 years old. Brush 5 currently has a 200 gallon water tank and does not meet the minimum standard to be listed as a Type 6. Replacement of the Brush truck water tanks with a 4 hundred gallon tank and replacing the pumps and pump motors is becoming a necessity.

- Conducted Pack test to all current red card members of the fire department.
- Inventory of wildland fire equipment was made for the fire cache and brush trucks
- In coordination with the fleet manager, trucks serviced for the 2016 fire season
- Bendix King radios were installed

- Callout sheet was created to aid in calling out Engine Bosses and Firefighters in a systematic order
- Revamped the personnel reimbursing form to recoup funding for fire assignments

- Support local Fire Wise chapter and outreach to improve the Districts defensible and fire safe subdivisions

2017 Goals

The Wildland Division will continue to grow and meet the increasing needs of the District and continue to serve and protect the District with pride and distinction. We will continue to provide training and exposure to large scale fires and disasters. The Wildland Division will continue maintaining and improve the equipment. In-house training will be conducted all year. This requires a self-motivated individual that is highly qualified in both the structural side, wildland side and the all hazards side. The Division will continue to develop and maintain strong working relationships with our Fire Wise chapter and other forest health organizations. The Division will continue to build relationships with neighboring departments and the USFS San Juan National Forest. The Division will continue to become a training center for wildland firefighting by hosting as many National Wildfire Coordinating Group (NWCG) courses as possible.

TO ADOPT BUDGET

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Pagosa Fire Protection District has appointed the Fire Chief to prepare and submit a proposed 2017 budget to the Board at the proper time; and

WHEREAS, the Fire Chief has submitted a proposed budget to this Board on or before October 15, 2016, for its consideration; and

WHEREAS, upon due and proper notice, published in accordance with the law, said the proposed budget was open for inspection by the public at a designated place, and a public hearing was held on November 8, 2016, and interested electors were given the opportunity to file or register any objections to said proposed budget; and

WHEREAS, the budget has been prepared to comply with all terms, limitations and exemptions, including, but not limited to, reserve transfers and expenditure exemptions, under Article X, Section 20, of the Colorado Constitution ("TABOR") and other laws or obligations which are applicable to or binding upon the District; and

WHEREAS, whatever increases may have been made in the expenditures, like increases were added to the revenues so that the budget remains in balance, as required by law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Pagosa Fire Protection District:

- 1. That the budget as submitted, amended, and summarized by fund, hereby is, approved and adopted as the budget of the Pagosa Fire Protection District for the year 2017.
- 2. That reserves have been or are hereby established for each appropriate fund or combined as a single reserve fund as set forth in the Budget in order to preserve the spending exemption for reserves under TABOR, and all such reserves shall be transferred or expended within any fund as set forth in the budget.
- 3. That the budget, as submitted, amended and herein summarized by fund, be, and the same hereby is, approved and adopted as the budget of the Pagosa Fire Protection District for the 2017 fiscal year.
- 4. That the budget, as hereby approved and adopted, shall be certified by the Treasurer and/or Chairman of the District to all appropriate agencies and is made a part of the public records of the District.

TO SET MILL LEVIES

WHEREAS, the amount of money necessary to balance the budget for general operating expenses is \$1,008,784 and

WHEREAS, the amount of money necessary to balance the budget for abatements is \$3,002 and

WHEREAS, the 2015 valuation for assessment for the District, as certified by the Archuleta County Assessor, is \$248,041,365;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Pagosa Fire Protection District:

- 1. That for the purposes of meeting all general operating expenses of the District during the 2017 budget year, there is hereby levied a tax of 4.067 mills upon each dollar of the total valuation for assessment of all taxable property within the District for the year 2016, to raise \$1,008,784 in revenue.
- 2. That for abatement purposes, there is hereby levied a tax of 0.012 mills upon each dollar of the total valuation for assessment of all taxable property within the District to raise \$3,002 in revenue.
- 3. That the Treasurer and/or the Chairman of the District is hereby authorized and directed to immediately certify to the County Commissioners of Archuleta County, Colorado, the mill levy for the District as hereinabove determined and set.

TO APPROPRIATE SUMS OF MONEY

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the District has made provision therein for revenues in an amount equal to the total proposed expenditures as set forth in said budget; and

WHEREAS, it is not only required by law, but also necessary to appropriate the revenues provided in the budget to and for the purposes set forth in the budget, including any interfund transfers listed therein, so as not to impair the operations of the District.
